Atlanta, GA., January 17th, 2011: Today, January 17th, the Alliance of Nigerian Organizations in Georgia (ANOG), joined DeKalb NAACP and in fact the rest of the world in paying homage to one of the "World's Greatest Heroes," at an MLK Parade and Rally. This is the first time that ANOG will collaborate with DeKalb NAACP in celebrating Martin Luther King's legacy. Dr. King devoted his Life to Love, Peace, Non-violence, Civil Rights and Human Rights for All Mankind.

The purpose of ANOG participation in this parade/rally was to enable our Nigerian Community to reach out more to the larger community, foster bi-organizational relations and relate with Dr. Martin Luther King's fight for the freedom, equality, and dignity of all races and peoples.
